Why focus on dualising VET programmes?


- 1. For school leavers aged 14-18, the transition from school to employment is a formative and fundamental phase for a stable working life! Such a crucial interface should be designed in the best possible way!
- 2. Basic vocational qualifications aligned with labour market needs are the foundation for the ability to adapt to constant changes in society and economy.

 Without basic skilling there can be no upskilling!
- 3. Most countries already have (expensive) VET structures at secondary level.
 Dualisation of the VET programmes can lead to higher quality with often less state funding!
